on the farm. Organised by Laughton and District Agricultural Society, it attracted a large audience keen to learn how it's done and how the biodiversity gains have been achieved on the farm as a result of conservation and regenerative management practices on the farm; more recently including the farm's conversion to organic production. Alciston Court Farm covers some 500 acres of the Firle Estate west of Bo Peep Lane, centred around Alciston. Cereals on the farm include the novel mixed planting of wheat and bean crops together grown for wildfarmed.com. The farm includes wildflower strips and wild flower meadow hedgerow management, to promote insects and farmland birds, bees and butterflies. Estate Director Bob Baines says: "These regenerative farming practices and the conversion to organic comes with a financial risk for Miles's business. The level of ambition fits directly with our aims to continue to increase biodiversity across our ownership in balance with the sustainable production of food. All farms on the Estate are engaged in environmental management, but probably none more so than Miles, who has really embraced it." Miles who also now runs a flock of organic Romney Marsh Sheep as part of the farming system, said "some people find this less ordered wilder farm landscape untidy. For me, seeing the flowers, insect and bird life - well I just love it!"

We would like to thank all of those tenants who have worked with us in such a positive way this year as we seek to finalise our programme of twelve house sales. We are pleased to have been able to successfully offer alternative properties to the majority of the tenants affected, and we are delighted to be welcoming a number of these tenants and their families to Firle. This consolidation of Estate housing has allowed us to accelerate our repair and investment programme across the Estate and will ensure we can continue to provide rented accommodation in the locality that would otherwise not be available.

A new appointment to the Estate team this year, Rebecca Carey joined us as Weddings Manager. Building on her wealth of experience in hospitality, Rebecca's role involves the management of Firle Place as a wedding venue, as well as overseeing all wedding related activities, including liaising with Firle Church when couples are looking for a traditional ceremony. ### Olympic Connections



In this Olympic year, a new exhibition at Firle Place celebrates the life of Willy Grenfell, Lord Desborough, whose diplomacy and networking was instrumental in helping secure the first London Olympics in 1908. The maternal grandfather of the present Lord Gage, he was a man of boundless energy, an astonishingly talented all-round sportsman and high achieving public servant. His 'modest' early feats included climbing the Matterhorn and four nearby peaks, taking part in the famous dead-heat Boat Race of 1877, swimming across the foot of Niagara Falls, rowing the Channel and representing Great Britain in fencing.

The exhibition includes extracts from a new book that seeks to disentangle the myths surrounding the man, ranging from an assertion of his contemporaneous service on 115 committees, to supposedly fighting in the Sudan armed only with an umbrella. Yet his gilded

life was not untouched by the larger events of the day: in 1915 he and his wife Ettie lost both of their elder sons on the Western Front, they and their daughters enduring further grief losing their third son in a car crash in 1926. The small exhibition runs until 30 October. Titan of the Thames: The Life of Lord Desborough by Sandy Nairne and Peter Williams is published by Unbound.

### Boiler Juice!
